We Follow Day by Day

Our lives as believing, practicing Christians, for the most part, seem to fit seamlessly into the social, cultural, and political fabric of our local communities, our workplaces, and our nation. For most of us, this is what we strive for. We don't want others to regard us as odd, difficult, and troublesome. We want to stay within the borders of acceptable behavior. And we are followers of Christ.... There may be some tension between our desire to fit in and our commitment to follow.

Indeed, tension we may feel could be a sign of the depth of our commitment to follow Christ. I am writing this on the fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost, September 22. The gospel for this day, Luke 16:1-13, presents the tension by speaking of the "children of this age" as being "more shrewd" in dealing with secular society than are the "children of light." The implication seems to be that the children of light are not to be naïve. They should know the ways of the world and should be able to live and operate within them. And they should be able to do this while keeping clearly in mind that we cannot serve two masters. "You cannot serve God and wealth (*mammon*)." (*Luke 16:13*)

But we live in a society in which many institutions and individuals are powered by the pursuit of *mammon* almost as though *mammon* and accumulation of it were an end in itself.

We sense the difficulty of the word from Jesus. Think about this word as we live today and the following days. There probably will be moments when the words, the presence of Christ, will fade, and moments when it may seem inappropriate even to try to remember that presence, when the matter at hand properly demands all of our attention. To try to remember the presence of Christ in these moments may be a distraction that leads to confusion.

And yet Jesus does not let us off the hook. We cannot serve God and *mammon*. There is no doubt that God is the master we are to serve. And we live in this age. There is a tension here that Jesus does not resolve for us. It may be that St. Paul had this tension in mind when he wrote in the letter to the Philippians:

....work out your own salvation in fear and trembling....(2:12)

Vestry Highlights—October 2019

 The Junior Warden reported that the Building & Grounds Committee has agreed to research the possibility of having the mulch in the upper parking lot dividers replaced with gravel.



- Monies have been allocated for a cleaning team that will work on Tuesdays and Fridays while the sexton is out.
- A commercial can-opener has been obtained to be used by FACETS.
- Treasurer reported that the total income to date is \$298K and our expenses are \$250K.
- The Parish audit is continuing.
- St. Barnabas' pledge to the Diocese was raised from 11% to 12% of our annual income.
- Our disability insurance is being reviewed to ensure that we have the best coverage for the least cost.
- Parish Retreat (Shrine Mont): Mrs. Sayles plans to call a committee meeting soon. We will ask for feedback from the committee and the attendees concerning preferences for "uphill" or "downhill" venues.
- Mr. Westerlund will update our website. We need to ensure that our website reflects St. Barnabas' so that interested Rector applicants will be able to learn about
- Sharon Jones is our delegate to Diocesan Convention. Katie Westerlund (current Alternate Delegate) will succeed Sharon for a two-year term, 2020 and 2021. A new Alternate Delegate will need to be appointed to succeed Katie. Suggestions are welcome.
- Mr. Crutchley, Mr. Miller, and Mr. Carroll, outgoing vestry members, will be the nominating committee for the Vestry of 2020.
- The review/update of our By-Laws is ongoing. The By-laws need to dovetail with the canons of the Diocese and the wider church.
 - Canon Flanagan will be reviewing the By-Laws of other parishes. Canon Flanagan and Mr. Ed Ing will continue the review and amendment process.
- The Bishop's visitation is tentatively planned for Advent. Most likely, it will be the newest Bishop on the Diocesan staff.

San Juan Bautista (St. John the Baptist) - Palma Soriano, Cuba

In 2012, spurred by President Obama's loosening of the rules for visiting Cuba, four members of St. Barnabas' went on an exploratory mission trip to the Episcopal Diocese of Cuba. They visited the cathedral and four church buildings, but it was the ruins of a small church that captured their attention. The congregation of about two dozen worshiped next door to the ruins, up a narrow stairway with no railing, crowded into the living room of a small duplex. When the congregation of St. Barnabas' heard about this, they raised the funds necessary to restore the ruins of San Juan Bautista (St. John the Baptist) in Palma Soriano to a usable church building.

In 2018, General Convention restored the membership of the Diocese of Cuba and asked that congregations get to know their brothers and sisters in Cuba. In response to this call, St. Barnabas' organized a mission trip to visit St. John the Baptist. It was mutually agreed to conduct a Vacation Bible School (VBS) program. San Juan Bautista usually has a two-day VBS: one day of Bible study and one day at the beach. With extra people and materials from St. Barnabas' it was decided that VBS would be two days of Bible study and one day at the beach.

San Juan Bautista is a small chapel with a sacristy on the back. The deacon, Noel, who runs the church lived in a small rented house with his wife Teresa. The bishop had purchased a large lot with the ruins of a house, planning that it could gradually be built into a parish building with office, residence, storage, and a guest room. Hurricane Sandy had since damaged the ruins of the house so that it would take considerable funding to do anything with it.

This year, the congregation of St. Barnabas' gathered funding for church linens, candles, and other liturgical needs; VBS supplies; and funds to begin work on the parish building. On July 15, Norma Ricketts, Wendy Williams, Eileen Walsh, and Len LeRoy set out for Cuba. One of the keys to mission work is flexibility.

Shortly before we arrived in Cuba, the deacon and his wife were evicted from their rented home because the owner was going to sell the house. They were now living in the sacristy, as rentals are very difficult to find in Cuba. The day before we arrived, the bus drivers in that area went on strike, so transportation to the beach was questionable.

After a day of travel and orientation, we had a great VBS. The people of San Juan Bautista were thrilled to have a visit from an American parish. They loved us and we loved them. At the end of the second day of VBS, there were no busses to be had for a trip to the beach. Wendy suggested that we take the sports gear that she had brought to an athletic field in walking distance from the church and have a field day. The field day was a huge success. Noel said that it was better than the days that they had gone to the beach. I think that the people who had the most fun were the older women who came back laughing and teasing each other about how slowly they ran the bases in baseball.

The week after we returned, Noel's former landlord informed him that the sale of the house had fallen through and Noel could buy it. We discussed it with parish leaders at St. Barnabas' and with the Archdeacon who has responsibility for San Juan Bautista. Following our discussions, the bishop gave Noel permission to spend some of the money intended for the parish house to purchase the former rental house for the church.

Now we are looking forward to helping San Juan Bautista with Christmas/Epiphany and to Noel's ordination to the priesthood (date TBA). Then we'll start planning for next summer.

Paul doesn't leave us with this word. Nor does he give us a detailed "how to" plan for achieving salvation. He recommends "on the job" training, training not only on Sunday in church, but training in the midst of the secular world, in the world of our occupations and social activities, in our lives of getting and spending. He does offer this word of encouragement to the Philippians and to us:

...for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for his good pleasure. (2:13)

Although my words are written in late September, you are reading them in November. In the interval of a month and more much has happened in our world, in our nation, in our individual lives. I invite you to reflect on your life as you have lived it in the interval, your life as a child of light and as a child of this age.

Perhaps Luke's version of Jesus' invitation to discipleship may be helpful as we think about ourselves as disciples. In almost the same words Matthew and Mark record Jesus' invitation to the Twelve and to everyone to follow him.

Matthew says this:

If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. (16-24) Luke adds a word to the invitation not found in Matthew and Mark.

If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross <u>daily</u> and follow me. (Luke 9:23)

The implication offered by this word is that we follow day by day. The word does not change the nature of discipleship. The cross taken up daily still means dying to self and embracing Christ. But the commitment to follow is not given in one final, dramatic decision. We renew it one day at a time as we offer our lives in service to others.

We are "children of this age," wise in the ways of the world, and simultaneously in training to be "children of light." Playing an essential role in this daily taking up of our cross is the community of followers—the church—offering us teaching and support, encouragement and forgiveness as we, together, make our way with Jesus to the day of Resurrection.

The retreat built on the work St. Barnabas' has been engaged in for several years around the broad topic of racial reconciliation. We hope to continue the discussion over the next several months.











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
