# **Discerning Our Way**

Dear Friends,

For the conclusion of the September Vestry meeting, I offered the prayer for the human family, found on page 815 of the Book of Common Prayer. I was particularly drawn to the fact that the prayer names "our struggle and confusion" as we seek to accomplish God's purposes.

We are living through a time of particular "struggle and confusion" in our nation and across the world, and it is in this context that faithful discernment has become even more powerful and crucial as a spiritual discipline that helps us to stay grounded in our faith, following our unique calling by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit. Discernment has to do with clarifying our understanding of God's particular call on our life, in the midst of our life. Discernment doesn't mean that we won't experience disappointment or frustration at times. But it does mean that we are seeking to faithfully be a part of God's creative healing and redemption of our world, following Christ's example and call. A long time ago, a friend recommended a book, "The Way of Discernment: Spiritual Practices for Decision Making" by Elizabeth Liebert. It helped me at that time to read about how sometimes God's revelation and guidance can happen through our intuition, through the wisdom of our bodies, and through the insight of imagination, in addition to our well-reasoned processes of planning and our abstract thinking, as we engage the work of theological reflection.

Another friend suggested that sometimes the process of discernment involves being willing to take the risk of new or different relationships, reaching out to friends, colleagues, mentors, mentees, and even individuals we may not know all that well (yet!), for the sake of obtaining information about what a particular potential future path might look like and involve. For me as an introvert, it was helpful for me to be reminded that our calling to go forth, our calling to seek and serve God in the world, is a calling that also simultaneously helps us to learn more about our particular gifts and unfolding roles. Exploring new ways to serve doesn't just challenge us to learn something new: it also gives us the opportunity to learn and listen to how our intuition, our body, and our mind is responding to different kinds of roles and situations. This is all helpful information to draw upon, as we seek to envision future grace-filled possibilities for offering our gifts down the road. Barnabas, EPISCOPAL CHURCH

But I hope that an inspired and ongoing practice of discernment can provide space for some new beginnings in your life, however small. Our Blessing of the Backpacks and Work Tools on Sunday September 13<sup>th</sup> was a celebration of the beginning of our program and school year—but there are other seeds of new beginnings that God may be planting in the upcoming year, each bringing with it the possibility for miraculous growth and transformation in God's good time. In the words of the Prayer for the Human Family,

O God, you made us in your own image and redeemed us through Jesus your Son: Look with compassion on the whole human family; take away the arrogance and hatred which infect our hearts; break down the walls that separate us; unite us in bonds of love; and work through our struggle and confusion to accomplish your purposes on earth; that, in your good time, all nations and races may serve you in harmony around your heavenly throne; through Jesus Christ our Lord. We would like to maintain the outreach and community service that St. Barnabas' provides so we need to balance limited resources against efforts to be surged and others that may be put on hold. Please let us know which projects need funding or not.

St. Barnabas' upgraded its business internet to 300/30 so we could better provide streaming services to our membership. St. Barnabas received a neat three-year deal which sets us up for success in these times of COVID.

To date, St. Barnabas' has received \$270,000 of its \$392,000 pledges for 2020. Thank you again to everyone who has kept up with their pledge giving. Canon Carol often said that a good figure for healthy parishes is about \$400,000 on average, and getting to that point indicates a parish will be around for a long time.

• In-Person Worship Outdoors

The outdoor service on September 13<sup>th</sup> was well-received: 20 attended the 8:00 a.m. service in person, and at least 38 attended online; 54 people attended the 10:15 service in person, and at least 73 online.

Weather permitting, in-person worship will continue outdoors on the first Sunday of the month, and the 10:15 a.m. service will be live streamed. The other Sundays' services will be broadcast via Facebook and YouTube.

We plan to live stream only the 10:15 a.m. service on October 4th and November 1st.

# The Heart of St. Barnabas'

Ingathering – it is a time of discernment, and the season in which we are asked to be intentional in our financial commitment to the church. For many, this is an uncomfortable topic to discuss, moreso in times of great uncertainty and anxiety. So I find myself asking, "Why did I volunteer to write a Stewardship article for the Reporter?"

I confess that the first few several drafts of my article were filled with ham-handed, or cutesy ways to work this year's Stewardship theme into the text. I focused on the typical things one finds in Stewardship writings: why we should pledge; the ways the church used this year's pledges to provide support to the community; and what pledging can do

for the giver. I quoted Scripture, and sometimes fell into a trap of using Stewardship-talk like "proportional giving", "aspirational budgeting", and "stretch and grow pledging". (Okay, I made that last one up, but it sounds like it could be a thing.)

They all had some good points, but sounded hollow in my ears – they lacked the emotional connection that I was trying to make. They didn't convey the primary reason I feel called to Stewardship, which is that St. Barnabas' is a special place to me. I want it to grow and thrive so we can continue as a church family. I have experienced the joy of fellowship at Spaghetti Dinners, Oktoberfests, and Game Nights. I have had the chance to have deep, meaningful conversations that gave me a better understanding of what I didn't know, and an insight into other's experiences. I have developed a connection to God and Jesus, and a sense of church family unlike any I have known.

Wonderful, positive experiences such as these are often mentioned when people are asked why they are part of St. Barnabas'. These moments fill our annual reports, newsletters, and Adult Forum discussions. They reinforce that the heart of St. Barnabas' is the welcoming, loving, and inclusive spirit of the congregation.

But they are not the only moments that reflect the heart of St. Barnabas'. The spirit of love can be seen when a comforting hug is given as someone's pain pours out in uncontrolled sobbing; when a flicker of light flashes in a lonely person's eyes at the realization they are not alone; and when tense muscles relax as a burden is shared. I feel a part of it when I serve our neighbors as part of the FACETS team. We receive thanks for the meals, but I know they are also thanking us for treating them with dignity. They need the love and caring of St. Barnabas' almost more than the food.

The prospect of creating more opportunities for people to be part of, and receive the love of the heart of St. Barnabas' is what drives me to give my time, talents, and treasure. Therefore, as you prayerfully consider your pledge, remember you are part of the heart of St. Barnabas'. Reflect on the positive impact you can have on people's lives as we grow God's good works.

There is one Body and one Spirit; There is one hope in God's call to us; One Lord, one Faith, one Baptism; One God and Father of all.

# **ACCA News – Annandale Christian Community for Action**

**CROP Hunger Walk** – ACCA is planning a virtual Annandale CROP Hunger Walk. Join with us to raise funds for Church World Service and ACCA to fight poverty and to respond to disasters. **Family Emergency and Food** – ACCA continues to respond to significantly increased calls for rent and food assistance due to economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic. ACCA works closely with Fairfax County social services to help people who are at risk of eviction or having power cut off, making payments directly to the landlord or utility. ACCA is using money from the Fairfax County allocation of Federal CARES Act funds to help those affected economically by the pandemic. ACCA expects to exhaust CARES assistance this fall. Donations to ACCA can be made online at <u>https://accacares.org/</u> or by check to ACCA, 7200 Columbia Pike, Annandale, VA 22003.

The ACCA Food Pantry gives a week's groceries and personal care products to a household that has an urgent need. Volunteers receive requests from Fairfax County staff, and volunteers bag and deliver food and other items to the household in need. Deliveries include donated nonperishable food, laundry soap, personal care products, toilet paper, and special needs such as diapers and fresh dairy and produce. The food pantry is collecting donations of nonperishable food and hygiene items at 7200 Columbia Pike, Annandale- weekdays between 1 p.m. and 5 p.m. You can bring donations to St. Barnabas' by arrangement with the Parish Administrator or bring food to the monthly outdoor service.

**Furniture** – St. Barnabas is scheduled to provide volunteers for the furniture ministry on October 10 (8 a.m. to 11:30 a.m.). Volunteers will pick up donations and deliver furniture to low-income households in need. Protocols have been developed to help protect volunteers and those who receive furniture from spread of the coronavirus. We meet at the warehouse on the grounds of Annandale United Methodist Church, 6935 Columbia Pike, Annandale.

**Child Development Center** – The ACCA CDC is meeting state guidelines for safe operation during the pandemic, and is now able to serve children at about 90 percent of its usual capacity. This summer the center served infants, toddlers, preschool, and school aged children.

**Transportation** – ACCA is working with the Shepherd Center to provide rides for senior citizens. In August, the program provided 38 two-way rides.

### Women of St. Barnabas' (WOSB) News

The Women of St. Barnabas' (WOSB) have been meeting by e-mail and telephone since March. Our Treasurer, Camille Mittelholtz, has been keeping us up-to-date on funding of our Inreach/Outreach charities and organizations. As of August we have given to the ACCA Challenge Grant, the ACCA Food Pantry, Church World Service (hygiene kits), and Episcopal Relief and Development. For Inreach we have given to the Rector's Discretionary Fund and the Youth Pilgrimage.

We earn our money by sponsoring events during the year. Our biggest money maker is our Christmas Bazaar held over Friday night and during the day on Saturday one weekend in November. Of course, we do not plan to have it this year and so will not have the funds to spend as we did last year. This year we will fund our charities at a lower rate, with a total donation budget of \$4,500. Going forward we will give to the following: Inreach—the Rector's fund and the Youth Pilgrimage; Outreach—ACCA, ASYP, Annandale UMC Heritage Site (another local food pantry), Bethany House, the Boys Home of Virginia, Grace Inside Prison Ministry, Jackson-Feild Homes, Northern Virginia Mental Health Institute, Rebuilding Together Express, Warrior Canine Connection, and the Episcopal Church Women. We also invite church members to suggest other charities and organizations that may need our support.

Our vice-president, Janet George, has recently sent \$25 from the Miles of Pennies jars to the diocesan office. Miles of Pennies was started by Episcopal Church Women in NYC in 1888 to help supply books for seminarians. While its mission has evolved, grants of a mile of pennies—\$844.80—are are given to organizations who supply reading materials for children and for other good causes.

While we are limiting physical contact during the pandemic, if you would like to donate to Miles of Pennies or any of the other causes we support, please make a check out to WOSB (not to St. Barnabas') and indicate in the memo line how you would like the donation allocated. General donations are encouraged, as well. Cash donations (pennies! ...nickels, dimes, and quarters, too) may be dropped off at the Parish Office on Mondays and Thursdays.

We would like to thank Mariel York for organizing a virtual English High Tea for the ladies of the church. Several of us met on Zoom on Friday, September 11<sup>th</sup>, and had a lovely time. We shared our unusual tea pots and cups. Mariel shared some visuals of the history of the English tea and pictures of interesting tea pots. She plans to schedule our next tea on a Saturday to accommodate those with a full weekday schedule.

When we are able to have meetings in the church we will schedule a WOSB meeting. Until then let us keep in touch. - Gertrude Jones
