Arise, shine for your light has come. Here is the message of Epiphany, the good news that is ours to share with the world. We have seen the face of Christ, the Light of the World. That light is life changing for us and for the world.

Yet the season of Epiphany is especially short this year. Ash Wednesday ushers in Lent on February 10, taking us into the wilderness all too soon. Life is like that. The dark days in the desert are never far away. So we learn as Christians to embrace the light even as we walk through the desert of darkness and the unknown.

Our vestry has begun the year with a retreat where light was shining even in the darkness. The group shared poignant stories of God's presence in the life of St. Barnabas' past and present. There was an honoring of the past leadership and a deep sense of the significance of the mantle of leadership that they carry.

Even as the group has begun the year with an extreme budgetary challenge, it was clear that dollars do not tell the whole story of the life of God's people in this place. At the same time, there was a commitment to address the reality that the health of our giving must improve to sustain a gathered people whose ministry and life together involve bills and salaries.

Our vestry articulated commitments--not the usual goals that may or may not be met in the coming year. Now it is time for the rest of us to join in with commitments in support of our mission to share the light of Christ. One vestry commitment is to engage our children and youth in a broader range of our worship and outreach activities.

Upon reflection, I am confident that this will happen--in part because the youngest among us have not yet learned to say "No." They are filled with the presence of Christ and have not developed a default response of assuming they lack the time or gifts to meet new challenges and opportunities. They can let the Holy Spirit move and surprise us.

I have declared this Year of the Gospel of Luke to be the Year of the Holy Spirit at St. Barnabas.' May we trust the Holy Spirit to guide us through both the joy of the light and the challenges of darkness. May we relish this Epiphany in its brevity that we may be ready to embrace the growth and depth that await us in the wilderness of Lent. May we share our journeys that our journey may make us one in Christ.

FCPD Needs Your Help

The Fairfax County Police Department and the anti-human trafficking programs need your help. The human trafficking unit was dissolved on January 11, 2016, and Det. Bill Woolf, formerly the only detective in the human trafficking division, was transferred into the major crimes department, working on crimes against children. All his regular work will go on, and all new calls will be transferred to him. Unfortunately, there is no funding available to provide him with help. Typically, a detective investigating such crimes would only have 3 or 4 cases at a time, according to national standards. Det. Woolf has over 40 cases normally. He recently had one file that had over 70 victims. That took time and attention away from everything else.

Contact your Fairfax County District Supervisor, or all the Fairfax County District Supervisors. Express your concern about this issue. Request they fund a dedicated police task group to fight this horrible crime against men and women, boys and girls in Fairfax County. Let them know our women and children ARE NOT FOR SALE!

VTS Honors Robert Frye with Dean's Cross Award

The Very Rev. Ian S. Markham, Ph.D., dean and president of Virginia Theological Seminary, and the Rt. Rev, James Shand, chairman of the board of directors at VTS, awarded our own St. Barnabas' parishioner, Robert (Bob) Frye with the Dean's Cross for Servant Leadership during the Service of Advent Lessons & Carols at Virginia Theological Seminary's Immanuel Chapel on December 6, 2015.

Bob, a former Chairman of the Fairfax County School Board, was recognized for his leadership and direction for almost 20 years to the Fairfax County public school system. As an at-large Board Member, he played a key role in shaping what has been recognized as one of the best large school districts in the country.

The 2015 Dean's Cross was also awarded to former First Lady Barbara Bush (in absentia) and Mr. Stanley B. Hubbard, Jr., who serves as ninth president and chief executive officer of Kanuga Conferences, Inc.

Established in 2008, the Dean's Cross for Servant Leadership in Church and Society recognizes outstanding leaders who embody their baptismal vows to "strive for justice and peace among all people and respect the dignity of every human being." Selected annually by VTS' dean in consultation with the chair of the Board of Trustees, the honorees receive a handmade silver cross, modeled after the seminary chapel cross, and a certificate.

UPCOMING MUSIC EVENTS



No Turning Back

Who were we made to be? That was just one of the questions we explored in our recent workshop, *No Turning Back: Continuing the Conversation on Race and Identity as People of God.* The workshop, led by Judy Fentress-Williams, professor of Old Testament at Virginia Theological Seminary, was held at St. Barnabas' on Saturday, January 9.

We began the day by thinking about how our personal identities are formed. Where did we come from? Who made us? Where do we belong now? We looked for answers to these questions in Genesis 1 and 2. God made us in his image. God made us to be in relationship not only with him, but also with the other human creatures he has made. Then Cain kills Abel and we have the first making a human brother in to *other*. Cain is punished for killing his brother, but the race goes on. More children are born, new families are formed. Some war with each other. Some consider themselves to be God's people, and exclude others. We are not the same. Differences abound. We can not be color-blind. What are the implications for us being part of this great family?

The next part of the morning we studied the story of Ruth. Here we heard about a woman in the country of Moab. She had married a Jew who had died, and she wanted to stay within his family, and return with her mother-in-law, Naomi, to the land of Judah. Here is a woman, from completely the wrong family, the wrong nation. She has no standing among the people of Judah, and yet she is to marry and live among them, and to be the ancestor of David, king of Judah. Ruth's identity, the unfolding of her life, shows how God works against the stereotype. (Ruth is strong enough to marry a Jew. She chooses to leave her home, and live in the land of Judah. Her virtue and faithfulness win her favor in the eyes of Boaz, the man she marries.)

At the end of the workshop, Dr. Fentress-Williams left us with more questions to ponder:

- What role does race/ethnicity play in our identity?
- How do we uniquely reflect the image of God and live in relationship?
- What elements need to be a part of our ongoing dialogue?
- What is God calling us to do/be as we continue on this journey? The dialogue continues...

ACCA News—Annandale Christian Community for Action

The Rebuilding Together home repair workday will be Saturday, April 30. The project is organized by Rebuilding Together of Arlington, Fairfax and Falls Church to help make houses safer and more livable for low-income homeowners and non-profit organizations operating group homes. ACCA churches and volunteers have rehabilitated 117 houses over the last 26 years. Frank Spink and Ken Mittelholtz will again be serving as "house captains" (project managers), and St. Barnabas' has budgeted funds for our co-sponsorship of a house. Volunteers at all skill levels will be needed. We will know more about specific skill needs after we receive our assignment in early March. St. Barnabas' is on duty to help at the ACCA furniture warehouse on January 30 and on March 5. If you can help, please come to the warehouse on the grounds of Annandale United Methodist Church on Columbia Pike, at 8 a.m. Volunteers pick up donations of used furniture and deliver furniture to households that need it. Thanks to Scott Moser for helping on December 5.

Thank you to everyone who contributed to the ACCA Challenge Campaign, held from November 2015 through January 2016. The campaign is ACCA's major fund-raising effort, and supplements funding from ACCA churches, grants, and Fairfax County. The funds raised by the campaign will help ACCA provide emergency assistance and other critical services for neighbors in need, and supports the developmental child care center for infants and preschool children of working families.

Many thanks to all who supported the fall 2015 Annandale CROP Hunger Walk. The walk raises funds to help Church World Service support hunger and disaster relief, refugee resettlement and sustainable development projects around the world. St. Barnabas' raised a total of \$3,320, including cash, check and online donations, for Church World Service. The 2015 Annandale CROP Hunger Walk raised a total of \$12,255 as of mid-January. CWS shares part of the funds raised by the Annandale walk with ACCA—in late 2015, ACCA received \$4,735 as the local share from the 2014 Annandale Walk. Special thanks go to our walkers and volunteers—Fred and Wanda Warren, Grace Robbins, Ann and Bob Sayles, Bonnie Baldwin, Elsa Cannon and Ken Mittelholtz. Camille Mittelholtz celebrated her 30th year as coordinator of the Annandale Walk.

St. Barnabas' participated in the ACCA-sponsored winter outerwear collection in December. Over 80 large bags of outerwear were collected and distributed to day laborers, to children at the ACCA Child Development Center, and residents at the Baileys Crossroads Shelter. We thank those who donated jackets, coats, hats and gloves. There will be a second outerwear clothing drive in February.


Sing to the Lord a New Song

Advent and Christmas—What a wonderful liturgical season! The four weeks we spent preparing for the coming of Christ heightens our anticipation for the Feast of the Incarnation.
