The Rev. Linda Wofford Hawkins, Rector

As I write, my departure from St. Barnabas' draws nigh. Even though I have moved on from churches before, it is the first time that retiring (or rewiring) lies ahead. For many—the youngest among us and those who are new to life in the church—it is the first time to say farewell to a rector. For us all, discovery and the unknown lie ahead.



I will be entering five months of sabbatical when rest, exercise, and healthy eating will be the first plan. I will move

into the joys of gardening, hiking, basketball, reading, and time with family and friends. My family is blessed to have built twenty-two years ago a home at the end of the Blue Ridge Mountains in the tip of South Carolina where we are near family and longstanding friends. That house will increasingly be home base, even as my husband Barney continues as Vice-President for Institutional Advancement at the Virginia Theological Seminary and my daughter Ellen continues life in Alexandria. I will travel as much as feasible. It will help that Barney has a funded sabbatical in 2017.

My calling as a priest will continue. I hope to embrace the writing that has taken a backseat in recent years. My writing life will be rooted in the ministry I have been privileged to share with you. As Eugene Peterson has said, "Being a writer and being a pastor are virtually the same thing...-an entrance into chaos, the mess of things, and then the slow mysterious work of making something out of it....Prayer, intensity of spirit at attention before God, is at the heart of both...In writing, I am working with words; in pastoring, I am working with people. Not mere words or mere people, but words and people as carriers of spirit/Spirit."

Do not be surprised if I "flunk" retirement in time. Interim ministry or certainly substitute work in the church are likely. I might even indulge my fantasy of working in a garden center.

I will no longer be your pastor, but I will pray for you and your ministry in this place. Letting go will be a major part of my contribution to St. Barnabas'--as hard as it may be. My hope for St. Barnabas' is a fruitful time in between for reflection and self-study. An interim period is a healthy and life-giving process that will prepare you to embrace a new rector with whom you will enter the next stage of life as a congregation in mission and ministry.

Thank you for being carriers of Spirit for me, for one another, and for the world we serve. I am grateful for the privilege of walking with you in the path of Jesus.

Vestry Highlights by PJ Kennedy, Senior Warden

September

- The Vestry is still waiting for names and resumes of potential Interim Rectors from the Diocesan Office of Transition Ministry. Once the names have been received the Vestry will review them and call an Interim. The target date for having an Interim Rector in place is late November.
- The ASYP program will be granting college scholarships from the scholarship memorial fund to two members of the first ASYP class. The event will be held on Tuesday, September 27 at 4:00 p.m. All in the congregation are invited to attend.
- The Blessing of the Animals for St Francis Day will be held on October 9. Stay tuned for the service time.
- Mr. Young Kwon, our interim Minister of Music, has been working with both the Adult Choir and the Children's Choir, with the assistance of Leigh Kennedy, for both rehearsals and Sunday worship.
- The Vestry has agreed to move the church database software from Logos to ACS. LOGOS support has been dramatically reduced, and we have been searching for a replacement. The switchover will occur in the next few months.
- The Vestry responded to the Santa Sion de el Salvador congregation's request for rental space with our financial requirements and time/space availability. Santa Sion requested every Saturday afternoon, which the Vestry feels we cannot provide. Unless there is a change in the time request we will not be renting to Santa Sion.

Projects Great and Small

The Building & Grounds Committee works for the Vestry and supports the activities of the Junior Warden. It is a direct successor of the earlier Facilities and Major Repairs Committees. Generally B&G manages projects which require a commercial contract but our members are also very "hands-on." We are a focal point for issues about St. Barnabas' infrastructure, both inside and out. We research, review, and evaluate proposed solutions to renovation, repair, or remodeling projects. The committee recommends solutions and plans to the Vestry, including cost estimates. Project funding generally comes from the annual budget, the church's reserve fund, or memorial gifts.

If you were a fan of "This Old House" or watch HGTV you know about the "while we're at it" syndrome which often leads to project expansion. Many of the discussions in the Committee involve discerning the "nice to have" ideas from the "must do" items like fixing the rotting beams. Other instances of scope expansion are caused by County or State regulations and requirements which emerge or change during the life of the project. We had several examples of this, such as the new emergency lighting in the nave, with the choir loft renovation project.

Things We Have Done

Since our 2013 startup the B&G Committee and its members have accomplished numerous projects great and small for St. Barnabas'. Some of these include:

Repaired the water-damaged drywall in the chancel clerestory window area.

Repaired the deteriorating concrete footers under the beams by the main entrance sidewalk.

Replaced/repaired the rotting spots in the exterior wooden siding on the chancel.

Replaced the HVAC unit which serves the chancel.

Designed and installed the screening walls and plantings to beautify that area.

Repaired the rotted wood siding on the chancel exterior walls.

Rebuilt the steps and stone path leading to the memorial garden.

Assisted with decluttering efforts by recycling obsolete electronic equipment.

Completed the Worship Space Renewal project (choir loft, lighting, carpet), a multiyear effort.

Planned the March 2016 Working Together day.

Installed assistive technology for the choir loft.

Revamped our waste disposal contract to comply with County recycling guidelines.

Works in Progress

Narthex furniture project. We have some conceptual drawings for the furniture pieces and some ideas about architectural changes to better define the space. Possible funding sources have been identified. Frank Spink will convene a series of meetings with various interested parties/persons to get design input.

Repair of the woodpecker damage on the chancel exterior wall, now waiting on confirmation of a repair bid.

Sidewalk connection to the Memorial Garden. This will connect the parking all the way through to the existing ramp for handicap access.

Memorial Garden Directory of who is interred there. We are getting color samples from the manufacturer of the recommended product. We are also looking at signage for the Memorial Garden and the Labyrinth.

HVAC issues in Education Wing. We are considering upgrades or replacements to our aging equipment so that heating and cooling is provided more evenly.
