The Peace of the Lord

Recently, a parishioner asked me about the exchange of the peace. It has gotten me to thinking. The practice in parishes varies from those where it is announced by the celebrant but decidedly NOT exchanged, **EVER**, to those at the other end of the spectrum that treat it as “half-time.” Some of you have heard me quote Bishop Eugene Sutton who is known to say, “Please cease the Peace!”

So what is it we are doing at the peace? The Lutherans have a good description on their web site.

*“Sharing God’s peace is **not** simply offering a friendly hello to those sitting around you. Sharing God’s peace is **not** a time for catching up on news with your neighbor or for reminding someone about an upcoming meeting. Sharing God’s peace does **not** require each worshiper to offer a sign of God’s peace to every other worshiper present. The “exchange of peace” (also commonly called “sharing the peace” or “passing the peace”) is **an act of reconciliation that serves as a transition point between the Word and Meal portions of the liturgy.... The exchange of peace is a ministry, an announcement of grace we make to each other, a summary of the gift given to us in the liturgy of the Word. This ministry ...is far greater than a sociable handshake or a ritual of friendship or a moment of informality. Because of the presence of Jesus Christ, we give to each other what we are saying: Christ’s own peace. Then, having been gathered by the Spirit around the Risen One present in the word, we turn to celebrate his meal”*** (emphasis supplied).

The exchange of the peace is a practice that dates back to the early years of the church, but got lost at the time of the Reformation – with one exception. The one place where it continued unbroken was in the marriage rite with the kissing of the bride. The passing of the peace was restored to our worship services in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer.

Here at St. Barnabas’ we are more likely to over-do it than under-do it. While some of our parishioners greet the people around them and then sit down, others feel they might be expected to greet absolutely everyone.

My caution to us all is that we must remain faithful to the intent of the peace—offering “Christ’s own peace”—and be considerate of those who may be new in our midst. It can be very intimidating to a visitor to be approached by a crowd of strangers. Putting ourselves “in their pews” would suggest greeting people at the peace with a dose of Episcopal restraint, and offering our personal fellowship at Coffee Hour.

Vestry Highlights - Summer 2018

The Vestry did not meet in July or August. During this time the Vestry approved by email a sidewalk that will improve access to the Memorial Garden from the parking lot. This project will address the concern that wheelchair access to the Memorial Garden is now only possible from inside the church.

The Vestry also received updates on several activities:

- The planning committee for the Shrine Mont parish retreat September 28-30 is working to plan the weekend, and the congregation has been invited to register.

- Fifteen volunteers participated in the July parish workday, and completed a great deal of weeding, mulch replacement, and minor repairs.

- The announcement for a proposed part-time Director of Christian Education position has been posted, with an invitation to submit applications to Canon Flanagan. The Vestry included this position in the 2018 budget, with the intention that this person would help lay leaders design, carry out, and evaluate the youth and adult Christian education and formation programs at St. Barnabas'.

- Second Story has asked St. Barnabas' to host the Annandale Safe Youth Project a fourth day, allowing the program to operate Monday through Thursday for the 2018-19 school year. (See separate article)

- The Building & Grounds Committee reported that it has received an estimate for the project to construct and install built-in furniture for the narthex. The project includes construction of cabinets in the church entry way, the narthex, and just inside the nave for storage of name tags, usher supplies, altar guild supplies, etc.

2018-19 Adult Forum to Focus on the Catechism of the Episcopal Church

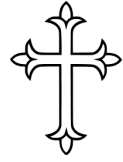
Are you familiar with the Catechism of the Episcopal Church? In short questions and answers, the Catechism outlines our principles of faith. The Catechism's importance led to its inclusion in the Book of Common Prayer as far back as 1549. Over the centuries it has been periodically revised to be more clearly understood. The current, 1979 "American" Catechism has become so influential, the Oxford Guide to the Book of Common Prayer observes, that it has been largely adopted by other provinces of the Anglican Communion.

Of greater significance than the text itself, is the Episcopal Church's insistence that the Catechism is “a point of departure.” It is a launching point for us to examine, understand, and live our faith. In this light, the recurring theme for the 2018-2019 Adult Forum sessions is an exploration of the Catechism's chief topics—their background, meaning, and intent. The sessions take place at 9:15 a.m. on most Sundays in the Richardson Room.

Imperial Airlines Heroes Recognized

This state historical marker honoring the unsung heroes of Imperial Airlines (IA) Flight 201/8, was issued by the Virginia Department of Historic Resources. It was unveiled and dedicated June 21, 2018 at 1:00 pm in Richmond, Virginia.

Speakers at the ceremony included Senator Dave Marsden, who introduced in 2017 Senate Resolution #104 that the General Assembly passed to recognize the crash victims; Matt Gottlieb of the Virginia Department of Historic Resources; The Reverend Molly Bosscher of St. Paul's Episcopal Church (Richmond); and Phyllis McKoy and Paula Kirk, sisters of one of the unsung heroes, PVT Michael E. McAllister, U.S. Army.

The marker recalls an IA flight that crashed southeast of the city on November 8, 1961. At that time it was the worst crash in Virginia history, and the second deadliest single civilian aircraft in U.S. History. The crash resulted in an investigation and Congressional mandates in 1962 over some charter carriers.

The marker's manufacturing and installation costs were covered by generous donations from The Friends of the IA Historical Roadside Marker Project, which included many St. Barnabas' Church members and the Women of St. Barnabas' organization.

Kudos and many thanks to all who helped the marker project to come to fruition, a job well done!

The marker is located at the intersection of South 2nd and Spring Streets in Richmond. We hope you will be able to see it in person one day soon.

ACCA News – Annandale Christian Community for Action

The 2018 Annandale CROP Hunger Walk is planned for Saturday, October 20 at Lake Accotink Park. Registration starts at 8 am near the Marina. Come enjoy a walk around the beautiful lake and fellowship, while helping others. The walk raises funds for Church World Service (CWS), which funds programs for hunger, disaster and refugee relief, and sustainable development. CWS returns part of the funds raised by CROP Walks to local organizations like ACCA. Last year's Annandale CROP Hunger Walk raised \$18,214, and of this, CWS returned \$4,501 to ACCA. The NAEYC promotes high-quality learning by connecting practice, policy, and research. This accreditation ensures high-quality experiences for children in early childhood education programs. This approval is an important recognition of the excellent work done by ACCA CDC leadership and staff.

ACCA has committed to supporting a refugee family this year, in partnership with the Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services. ACCA planners expect to learn in early October about the family we will sponsor, and the family should arrive shortly after that. ACCA will provide the family with furniture from the Furniture Warehouse, and household items donated by members of ACCA churches. Volunteer drivers and mentors will be needed to help the family adjust. A dinner and discussion for volunteers will be held on Saturday, September 8th at Peace Lutheran Church from 5:00 - 8:00 p.m. Peace Lutheran is located at 6362 Lincolnia Road, Alexandria. The discussion is intended to improve awareness of the culture of the Middle East, especially Afghanistan, and will provide information for volunteers. 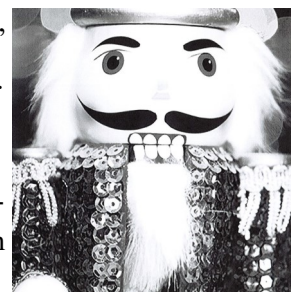
JEWELRY NEEDED

Dear Brothers and Sisters:

Bishop Shannon Johnston has announced that he will resign as our Bishop Diocesan during our Annual Convention in November 2018, and he will fully retire on June 30, 2019. In his letter of August 3, Bishop Shannon called for "new vision and new energy for the church in our Diocese." To create the best opportunity for that vision and energy, the Standing Committee is seeking a Bishop Provisional for election at the November convention, per General Convention Title III.13.1. We want to make all of you aware of the steps involved in this process, as we work for the good of our Diocese.

As stated in Bishop Shannon's letter, we have been in communication with the Presiding Bishop's Office to ensure a smooth transition. The process the Standing Committee will follow will be similar to what happens in a parish when a rector leaves, and an interim rector is appointed by the Vestry. In this case, the Standing Committee is working with the Presiding Bishop's Office of Pastoral Development to identify individuals who would be willing to serve as our Bishop Provisional for approximately three years, with extensions to that time frame, if needed, to be voted on at Diocesan Convention. As with any process like this, confidentiality will be kept to preserve the privacy of all involved.

This month, we are working to prepare questions to ask of the prospective candidates. We have sought input from Diocesan staff, current and former Bishops, leadership of Diocesan bodies, and the Regional Deans and Presidents to help us formulate these questions. We are also reviewing documents on file at the diocesan offices, to assist in preparing for these interviews, which we plan to hold in September. Once we have completed interviews, and a review of all paperwork, we will present the name of one candidate for the Diocese to elect in November, similar to the way a Vestry would for a parish.

This election will be the final act of our Annual Convention. The Bishop Provisional will be an experienced Bishop who will have the canonical authority of a Bishop Diocesan, and who will partner with us in a thorough diocesan review to enable us to prepare for a healthy call for our next Bishop Diocesan.

Many have asked about the role of Bishop Susan Goff in the Diocese as we move forward. In the same way that an associate or assistant rector is not eligible to serve as interim of a parish after the rector leaves, we have discerned, in close consultation with Bishop Goff, the Presiding Bishop and a variety of wise advisors, that our Bishop Suffragan will serve the Diocese best by remaining our Suffragan. She will be an integral part of the new team of leadership of our Diocese and we are grateful for the gifts she will continue to bring.

We ask for your prayers, for this process and for all the individuals involved, as we undertake this work. The best interests of this Diocese are at the center of all we do.
