### For an Election

Dear St. Barnabasians,

As I write this in mid-October, I am finding myself praying the prayer "For an Election" more often than I would like (it is on page 822 for all those interested). I also find myself wondering at times about those who are watching our electoral process from outside the United States—are they wondering how their country would do if they had the idiosyncrasies of our current electoral college system? Are they thankful to not have to deal with "battleground states" or, God forbid, an extended time of election litigation? Perhaps some others are longing for these kinds of "first world problems" and would be thrilled to approach them as a bold goal for the not-too distant future. I've heard it said that democracy is the worst form of government, except for all the other forms of government. And, I also still wonder in our modern era, if any gathering of citizens will be able to help their country become a model for others across the world, in terms of the most effective way to conduct an election.

And, whenever the results of the election become clear, I also wonder if it is possible that a significant proportion of our country could be feeling a little bit like those early Israelites who were carried off into Exile in Babylon. Regardless of which way the election goes, it is likely that some number of people are going to be feeling like they have been carried into a foreign and unfamiliar land that is not of their choosing. As I remember the refreshment of our Parish Retreat to Shrine Mont, I'm reminded that that was the single Sunday morning opportunity our Lectionary gives us, every three years, for hearing the Book of Esther in church (for churches using alternating tracks, the frequency would be one Sunday morning every six years). And it occurred to me that while it might be a bit extreme to describe the book of Esther as a story of human trafficking, it is certainly one of many biblical stories of people who were pursuing the abundant life God promises in the midst of limited circumstances. Esther and Mordecai persevered, despite the obstacles they faced in the unfamiliar land and culture in which they found themselves.

I was reminded by a St. Barnabasian recently, of the key importance of the Exile as an emotional, physical, spiritual, and moral context for the compilation as well as for a portion of the composition of most of our Hebrew Bible. And, for the most of recorded biblical history, the Israelites were not the ones who were politically "on top of the heap" as it were. Most of the time, they were navigating their way in the midst of various other earthly principalities and

powers. We could think of Jonah's bitterness, and his reluctance to let the residents of Nineveh hear a word from God—after all, Nineveh was the capital of the Assyrian empire that had taken innumerable numbers of individuals from the ten "lost tribes of Israel" and spread them across central Asia in a diaspora the predated the Babylonian Exile.

Anytime that humans start to think in terms of group identities, I think it is a natural human temptation to compare the best behavior and highest ideals of our own "in-group," to the worst behavior and lowest ideals of another outside group. I can understand Jonah participating in this bad habit because often the best leaders from within our own "ingroup" present us with an inspiring example of our highest ideals and best behavior—while the pain resulting from bad behavior by members of an outside group is often all too clear to us. This is especially true if the altruism of an outside group isn't clearly being directed towards us, or if opinions about the most altruistic shared path are not all in alignment with those from another group. And, for Esther and Mordecai, the path Haman and his henchmen had planned was actually precisely the opposite of altruism. And, while I'm thankful that our election is not as dire as the circumstances in the Book of Esther, I do still feel the need to pray:

Almighty God, to whom we must account for all our powers and privileges: Guide the people of the United States (and of this community) in the election of officials and representatives; that, by faithful administration and wise laws, the rights of all may be protected and our nation be enabled to fulfill your purposes; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

### Updating the St. Francis Garden



Since the founding of FACETS, 35 years ago, St Barnabas' has participated in their Hot Meals program, which was their first and keystone outreach activity.

Every **first Sunday of the month**, St. Barnabas' members and friends gather in the Richardson Room and kitchen to cook a hot meal and pack cold sides. Drivers then deliver the food to unhoused or food insecure families in the Fairfax area. We welcome all members and participants of St. Barnabas' to join in this fundamental outreach to our neighbors. The need has increased in recent months; increased participation will help us to meet the need.


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### Mark Sirett and "Sweet Was the Song"

I would like to introduce you to a friend and colleague of mine, Mark Sirett, a Canadian composer of choral music of great renown. Mark and I were both born in Kingston, Ontario, in 1952, but because we lived in different subdivisions, we attended different primary schools. We knew each other through the Monday night music recitals held in the library, and eventually attended the same high school and university. At Queens' University we were in the same music program, and were duo piano partners. Mark, at this time, was also the organist and choirmaster of Portsmouth United Methodist Church. He did post-graduate work in Alberta and served as choir director for St Paul's United Church in Edmonton from 1979-1986. He obtained his Masters in 1987 and his Doctorate in 1990 from the University of Iowa, but returned to Kingston in 1990 to become organist at St. George's Anglican Cathedral. In 1996, recognizing that there was a need for choirs available to everyone, not just affiliated with a church, he started Cantabile Choirs. Originally there were just a children's, a girls', and a women's choir, but he soon had to add a young men's, a junior choir, and a senior men's choir.

Mark has published over 200 compositions, mostly choral, ranging from sacred anthems and motets to musical theatre and



folk songs. His composition, "Sweet Was the Song the Virgin Sang," uses the text found in William Ballet's lute book in the library of Trinity College, Dublin, around 1600. A harmonization of it by Charles Wood can be found in *The Cowley Carol Book for Christmas, Easter, and Ascensiontide*, first series, 1901. The words are set to a modern, lilting tune, imitating the rocking of a cradle, with soaring peaks of hope and longing in the melody. It is a favorite song with university choirs and small elite groups.

St. Barnabas' Adult Choir will be performing "Sweet Was the Song" as the anthem during our Christmas Eve service at 4:30 PM. We invite one and all to attend and hear it live.

In 2022, Mark received the *Order of Canada* for his steadfast commitment to the field of choral music as a renowned composer, conductor, and community leader.

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### Who Was "Good King Wenceslas" and Why Do We Sing About Him?

Probably everyone at St. Barnabas has heard or sung the "traditional" Christmas carol "Good King Wenceslas." But where did it come from, whose tradition is it, and who was this "good king" anyway?

Let's start with the first question. The carol as we know it was published in 1853 by an Anglican clergyman, John Mason Neale (1818-1866), who was associated with the Oxford (High Church) Movement. The Oxford Movement lamented the state of English churches, both physical (deteriorating architecture, lack of decoration, ugly modern stoves for heating) and in ritual. Especially lacking in their eyes was congregational singing of hymns, nowadays such a part of our worship at St. B's. Until 1820, the only singing allowed in Anglican churches was metrical settings of the Psalms! Neale and others set out to create hymns for the Church of England.

Neale and his musical collaborator, Thomas Helmore, were given a copy of *Piae Cantiones* (Pious Songs), a collection of songs from a cathedral school in Finland, printed in Germany in 1582. Together they translated some of the Latin texts and made up English words to some of the tunes. "Good King Wenceslas" is a text composed by Neale to the tune from *Piae Cantiones*, "Tempus adest floridum" (Now comes the time of flowers), obviously a Spring carol. So, this song was born in 1853, and set to a tune that was not at all a Christmas song.

So much for tradition!

But who was this "good King Wenceslas," then? Wenceslas (in Czech, Václav) was duke of the Bohemians in the early tenth century. The ruling family had accepted Christianity only two generations earlier, and there was still resistance. Wenceslas's grandmother, Ludmila, ensured the young heir was raised in the faith, but she was martyred by supporters of the young boy's mother (who was from a pagan Slavic tribe) when Wenceslas was 13. When he came of age five years later, he sent his mother into retirement and directed the realm until his death. His brother, Boleslav, who disagreed with him over policy towards the neighboring Germans, arranged for Wenceslas's murder, probably in 935, and seized power in Bohemia in his own name.

Both Ludmila and Wenceslas were venerated as saints shortly after their deaths. Though he was only a duke, Wenceslas was post-humously recognized by the Holy Roman Emperor Otto I as king and saint and added to the Catholic calendar of saints (feast day September 28). Mere decades after his death, at least four versions of his saintly life were circulating, in the Old Slavic and Latin languages. He was especially praised in these hagiographies for his support of the poor, becoming the type of the "Righteous King" whose power came not from his strength but his piety and faith.

Venerated in the Czech lands down to the present day as the patron saint of the Czechs, Wenceslas has now become an inseparable part of Christmas celebrations in the English-speaking world, thanks to a nineteenth-century British clergyman!

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### God's Economy Can Work Miracles

A reflection by the now Rev. Celal Kamran, from the 2019 Diocese of Virginia Reflections for the Wonder in All Stewardship Campaign.

Rev. Celal was a Seminarian at St. Barnabas in winter 2020-2021 and was also a member of St. Barnabas' for several years when he was a child.

St. Barnabas' was an important part of his formation. He now serves as a Priest and Multicultural Missioner in Pennsylvania.

The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!' The Lord replied, 'If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea", and it would obey you.

- Luke 17:5-10

Increase our faith Lord, the apostles plea Jesus in our text. They have a deep desire to serve, and that is not always a given. Sometimes, I do not have this desire. Sometimes, I would rather serve myself or material things rather than the living God. This coming from a seminarian, who is devoting himself and his vocation to ministry, must seem odd. But our lives pull us in all sorts of directions, good and bad.

It can be hard to stay centered in God. But I do not think Jesus is asking us for what we might grandly imagine. The disciples might not have the faith they think they need, but they have a deep desire. A fellow seminarian said to me about his prayer life that nothing, absolutely nothing will get done until he has spent time centering himself with God. I loved that statement, and I hated how I fall short of that so many days. Regardless of my inaptitude towards this ideal, I have the desire. The desire for Christ to increase my faith. The desire to be centered in God in everything I do or leave undone.

Jesus responds with a reassurance. Faith like a mustard seed can be miraculous. And I think the disciples have shown their faith with their desire for faith. I am reminded of another text where a man tells Jesus, I believe, help my disbelief. In both narratives, the people want to have faith. In both cases Jesus reassures them.

They do not lack in faith but rather their desire redeems them and moves them closer to what they want. God does not ask for much, maybe just a mustard seed's worth of desire towards faith. So, in this time of annual giving, reflecting on what we imagine we are being called to give, I think our imaginations do not match with what is asked of us. If that was the case, we would all be called to be St. Francis, who gave everything he had. Rather, we are being called to desire faith in what we give. And use that faith, no matter how small, to use the gifts God has given us to do the work God has called us to do. Because God's economy can work miracles, if only we desire it.

- What does the desire to serve God look like in your life?
- When has your own stumbling revealed more than your success?
- What would moving the mulberry tree with faith look like in your life and in the life of your community?


